Rare Vintage Fight Footage Illustrates Kilbane's Career as a boxer

Cleveland's World Champion: Johnny Kilbane's Boxing Career Presented in collaboration with the Cleveland Public Library



Boxing historian Jerry Fitch (*Cleveland's Greatest Fighters of All Time*) and Johnny Kilbane's great-grandson Kevin O'Toole team up to present an overview of Johnny Kilbane's fighting career. Their presentation will feature vintage film footage from Kilbane's first title fight in 1912 and his 1921 League Park victory over Danny Frush, including footage from the O'Toole family collection that has just been restored and never been shown publicly before! The program will be repeated twice, first at the Main Branch of the Cleveland Public Library and again in Bridgie Neds Room in the basement of P.J. McIntyre's Irish Pub. Both events are free and open to the public.

Imbibe a Bit of History Along with a Fighting Heart Brew

Like many Irish immigrants living in "The Angle" by the Cuyahoga River, Johnny Kilbane's father worked on the docks. Johnny's first job was as a water boy on the docks, before he became a switchman on the railroad that transported cargo from the docks. The role of the Irish in the development of the city's shipping and transportation industries will be discussed by IAAS Executive Director Margaret Lynch and IAAS Board President Thomas D. Corrigan in a "History on Tap" presentation in the basement of the Great Lakes Brewing Company. On tap that night will be a keg of the "limited edition" Fighting Heart brew that Great Lakes Brewing Company first created in 2012 to celebrate the 100th anniversary of Johnny Kilbane's first title fight.

President's Note: New Grant Announced

It was recently announced that the Irish American Archives Society received a grant from The Honor Project, which is administered by Ohio Lawyers Give Back. First the legal background: Ohio Lawyers Give Back was founded by Dworken & Bernstein Co., L.P.A. to promote the use of "cy pres" in class action settlements. "Cy pres" is a doctrine used in class actions to handle settlement monies which are unclaimed by class members after distribution is finished. "Cy pres" means "as nearly as possible." It allows the court—or the parties by agreement—to put a beneficial use to monies, where the payment as intended has not been made. Since many class members have moved, passed-away, or can't be found, millions of settlement dollars go unclaimed. That settlement money is intended to benefit the class—rather than revert to the wrongdoing defendant—so the ancient doctrine is now being used to distribute the unclaimed money to charities and non profits. The law firm Dworken & Bernstein has taken the lead in using the doctrine of "cy pres" to distribute more than \$24 million dollars.

Irish American Archives Society is the recipient of this innovative and generous giving program. A grant has been awarded to advance research for a book commemorating the upcoming 150th anniversary of the St. Patrick's Day in Cleveland. IAAS will be working with the United Irish Societies and organizations that participate annually in the Parade to document the history of this signature event in Cleveland. 2017 has been designated as the centenary year, though research already suggests that the Irish were parading on the streets of Cleveland on St. Patrick's Day before 1867.
